The first two options each provide a wealth of resources. The one I have used and always recommend first is the link to material from The Mentoring Group. Their resource library is extensive and includes several workbooks and articles for mentors, mentees, mentorship planners, etc. It is the most diverse resource for mentorship of all types.

The SHRM mentoring URL goes to a site specific to planning a mentorship program. From there, you can link to other relevant pages on the site.

At the time I am posting the Mentorship monographs, I have not updated my reference list. However, each of the items listed remains helpful. Mentorship is a topic of high interest, with innovative models and resources regularly shared.
